HOW TO DO YOUR SURVEY

- 1) The target dates at the top of the columns are good times to survey, although any time is useful. Please write the actual survey date at the top of each column.
- 2) Ideally, visit on warm sunny days with air temperature above 14°C in bright sunshine (or warmer if sun is weak or intermittent).
- 3) When you see butterflies, note how many and in which habitat, using letters A to D as shown below. If there are other relevant habitats, please specify: e.g. butterflies basking on paths or walls (Habitat: E).

A: Old hedge or bushes	C: Area not mown
B: Regular close-mown area	D: Mown once or twice
- 4) Identification: RSNC Guide to Butterflies of the British Isles, by J.A.Thomas (Country Life Books) or *Guide to the Butterflies of Britain* wallchart produced by the Field Studies council.
- 5) It is helpful if you can draw a sketchmap of the churchyard, showing locations A-D and other features, and make a plant list – but even if you aren't a plant expert your surveys are welcome.
- 6) Please tell the Vicar or Churchwarden that you are carrying out the survey for Butterfly Conservation.
