Wider Countryside Butterfly Survey (WCBS) in Upper Thames Area 2012

The number of squares surveyed was one less than in 2011, with two less from BC recorders and one more from the BTO. The total number of visits was also down.

With a similar number of squares surveyed in all three years we can make rough comparisons again. Total counts were only 4% down on 2011 but 36% less than in 2010. This agrees broadly with the regional transect results.

Monthly counts were down by 13.6% in August and 93.5% in June but July counts were slightly up (by less than 1%). All three main months were exceptionally wet, especially June, with 2.9 times the local average rainfall. July was relatively the least wet, only 41% above average. Temperatures were also below average.

The number of species recorded was 24 compared with 26 in the previous years, with no hairstreaks or Brown Argus seen.

Counts were again dominated by Meadow Browns which, along with Large Whites had their best year of the three. The Small and Essex Skipper in aggregate increased by a factor of 2.9 over 2010 and 4.4 over 2011. They had a number of high counts including one of 87 in July and four others in double figures. Ringlet improved on 2011 but Gatekeeper was pushed from second into fourth place, decreasing again by 23% from 2011 and 39% from 2010.

Most species with significant counts decreased compared with the previous years, notably Common Blue with only four individuals compared with 469 in 2010. Small Tortoiseshell continued down, from 274 in 2010 to 13 in 2012.

In contrast to Butterflies, Dragonflies and Damselflies more than doubled in number, Three new species were recorded, but two less in total. Maybe the wet summer conditions suited them or it may be that more surveyors are recording odonata.

Three more moth species were recorded, four of them new. Nearly double the total number were counted, but half were the migrant Silver Y, not recorded in 2011. However, a total of 20 is only a fraction of the number of odonata.

It remains to be seen whether the summer of 2013 will bring better weather to allow the butterflies and moths to begin to recover from the disastrous past three years.
